The 78th Regular Session of the Nevada Legislature commenced on February 2, 2015, and ended on June 1, 2015. The 2015 Legislative Overview Report is a summary of all legislative activity during the 78th (2015) Session of the Nevada Legislature. The intent is to provide an overview of the legislative activity that had an impact on Washoe County. The report includes summaries of measures approved during the 2015 legislative session had a direct or indirect impact to the County. The information in this report should not be used as a substitute for the full text of legislative bills or for revisions for the Nevada Revised Statues.

Executive Summary

The 78th (2015) Legislature began on Monday, February 2, 2015 and adjourned *sine die* on Monday, June 1, 2015. A total of 1,297 bill draft requests were proposed by Legislators, State and Local Government Agencies, Legislative and Non-Legislative Committees.

The 2015 Legislative Report is a summary of all legislative activity during the 78th (2015) Session of the Nevada Legislature. The report includes summaries of measures approved during the 2015 legislative session that had a direct or indirect impact to the County. The information in this report should not be used as a substitute for the full text of legislative bills or for revisions for the Nevada Revised Statutes.



- 2015 Legislative Highlights -

The 78th (2015) Legislature was led by Governor Brian Sandoval, Majority Leader Michael Roberson and Speaker John Hambrick. Unlike previous sessions, the Republican party controlled the Executive and Legislative Branch. However, like previous sessions, the Legislature was tasked with funding state government.

Governor Brian Sandoval recommended a \$23 billion budget to fund State government for the 2015-2017 Biennium that was an increase from the requested amount of \$20 billion for the 2013-2015 Biennium. The Legislature approved Governor Sandoval's five spending bills totaling approximately over \$19 billion, of which \$1.1 billion was approved for the Governor's Nevada Revenue Plan that mostly focused on funding public education by raising it from \$400 million to \$2.8 billion, a 16% increase over the current budget to expand all-day kindergarten, fund English language learners and for the establishment of a new medical school in Southern Nevada. It was described as the largest one-time tax increase in the history of the State. Other topics of interest included addressing body cameras for law enforcement, prevailing wage, a new computer system for the Department of Motor Vehicles and making changes to the State's Live Entertainment Tax.

- Term Limits -

There was an initiative proposal to establish term limits for state and local elected officers. During the 1994 and 1996 general elections, voters approved term limits for State and local officers, including Legislators, who filed or ran for office during or after the 1998 election cycle. Assembly members are limited to 12 years or six terms in office. Senate members are limited to 12 years or three terms in office.

In the Assembly, the term for two members will expire on November 9, 2016. The 2014 election was the last eligible year for Assemblywoman Marilyn Kirkpatrick and Assemblyman Harvey Munford. The impacts of term limits will continue to increase each legislative session. According to the Research Division of the Legislative Counsel Bureau, two members are termed out on November 6, 2018, and the terms of two members will end on November 3, 2022. Additionally, 12 members are termed out on November 8, 2022, another six are termed out on November 5, 2024, and 16 are termed out on November 3, 2026. Finally, the terms of the remaining two members will end of November 7, 2028.

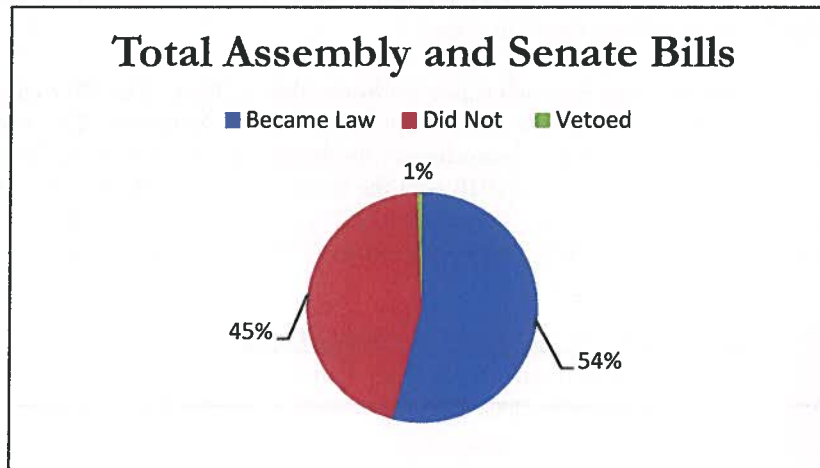

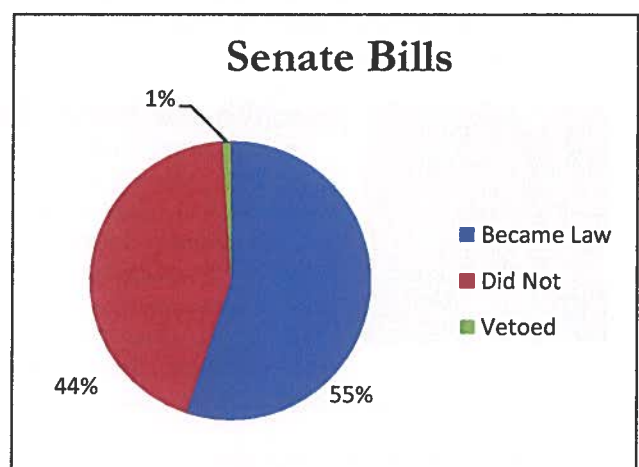
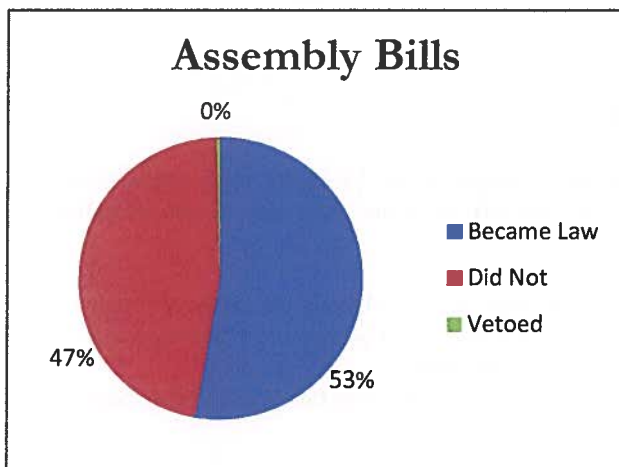


- 2015 Overall Bill Statistics-

During the 2015 Legislative Session, a total of 1,013 (54%) Assembly and Senate Bills became law. Of the bills, 459 (45%) bills did not become law and 7 (1%) bills were vetoed.



During the 2015 Legislative Session, the Legislative Counsel Bureau drafted **498** Assembly Bills and **515** Senate Bills. Of the Assembly Bills, 263 (53%) became law and 233 (47%) and 2 bills were vetoed. Of the Senate bills, 284 (55%) became law and 226 (44%) did not become law and 5 (1%) bill were vetoed.

TERM LIMITS—IMPACTS ON THE NEVADA STATE LEGISLATURE

This fact sheet shows the effect of term limits on the current members of the Nevada State Senate and Assembly. Term limits for State and local officers, including legislators, were approved by Nevada’s voters at the 1994 and 1996 General Elections following a successful initiative petition effort to amend the *Constitution of the State of Nevada*. The term limits state that no person may be elected or appointed as a Senator or a member of the Assembly “who has served in that Office, or at the expiration of his current term if he is so serving will have served, 12 years or more, from any district of this State.” Term limits were first applied to those legislators who were elected in 1998.

EFFECT OF TERM LIMITS ON NEVADA’S CURRENT STATE SENATORS

Assuming senators continually run for office in the Senate and are reelected, two senators’ terms expire on November 3, 2020, eight senators are termed out on November 8, 2022, another seven senators are termed out on November 5, 2024, three senators have terms expiring on November 3, 2026, and one senator has a term expiring on November 7, 2028.

EFFECT OF TERM LIMITS ON NEVADA'S CURRENT MEMBERS OF THE STATE ASSEMBLY

In the Assembly, the term of two current members will expire November 9, 2016. Assuming the remaining Assembly members continually run for office in the Assembly and are reelected, two members are termed out on November 6, 2018, and the terms of two members will end on November 3, 2020. In addition, twelve members are termed out on November 8, 2022, another six are termed out on November 5, 2024, and sixteen are termed out on November 3, 2026. Finally, the terms of the remaining two members will end November 7, 2028.

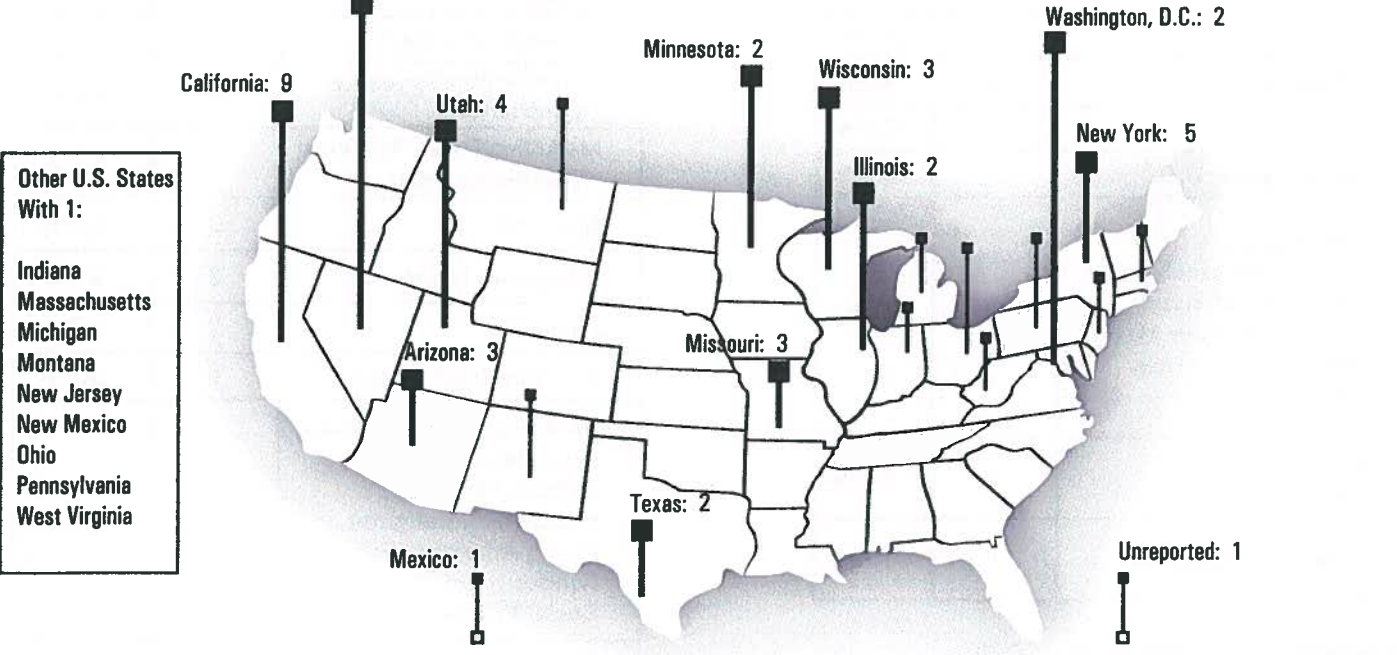

Legislative Principles**



- Washoe County Legislative Principles -

The following legislative principles, adopted by the Washoe County Commission, are used by staff, lobbyists and elected officials to guide their actions while representing Washoe County during the 2015 Legislative Session.

Respect for Governmental Roles

Partners Providing Service to Our Shared Constituents

All Governments in Nevada (State, County, Cities, School Districts, and Special Districts) are partners in providing consistent and reliable services to our shared constituents, and therefore all levels of government must be viable in order for our citizens to enjoy an outstanding quality of life. A great State requires strong, effective, mutually-respectful government at all levels.

Focus on Outcomes

Services to citizens should be provided efficiently; should be effective; and must demonstrate measurable results. All governments (State, County, Cities, School Districts, and Special Districts) should be held accountable for measurable outcomes and cost-effective performance, while at the same time be given the flexibility to let elected leaders decide how best to achieve those outcomes.

Local Determination

Statewide policy decisions should be made by State leaders; local policy decisions should be made by local leaders. Local governments must have the right to control their resources, and voters should have the ability to decide whether those resources are sufficient or not. Local governments should have discretion on delivering State programs and services when funding is reduced or diverted by the State.

Local Decision-Making and Flexibility

Washoe County urges the preservation of local prerogatives over matters traditionally and best governed at the local level. The legislature should encourage local officials and citizens to solve local problems. Legislation should foster local flexibility and assist local government leaders and the citizens they represent in addressing problems in ways that best serve their community.

Unfunded Mandates

Washoe County believes the Nevada State Legislature should not impose mandated functions, activities, or regulations on local governments without providing financial resources or means to meet the costs of carrying out those mandates.



- Washoe County Legislative Principles -

Recover Our Economic Strength

Support Economic Recovery and Development

Promote regional collaboration on economic development and support a coordinated regional response to the economic challenges and opportunities facing Northern Nevada.

Long Term, Sustainable Solutions

The economy and tax revenue base on which all governments in Nevada rely are undergoing a fundamental restructure. Simply shifting the service burden or revenues from one government service provider to another will not responsibly and sustainably meet the needs of the citizens of Nevada and Washoe County. All governments need to be working together toward long-term solutions for service provision and equitable, stable funding for those services, and not at one another's expense.

Fiscal Responsibility

Washoe County supports local government fiscal responsibility and long-term financial planning; including retaining and expanding tools at the local level to better manage budget and cash flow and responsibly structure revenue sources.

Regional Solutions to Service Provision

Intergovernmental Collaboration

Washoe County supports collaborative efforts of service providers within the region and the state to provide the best service possible at the lowest possible cost to the constituents of Washoe County.

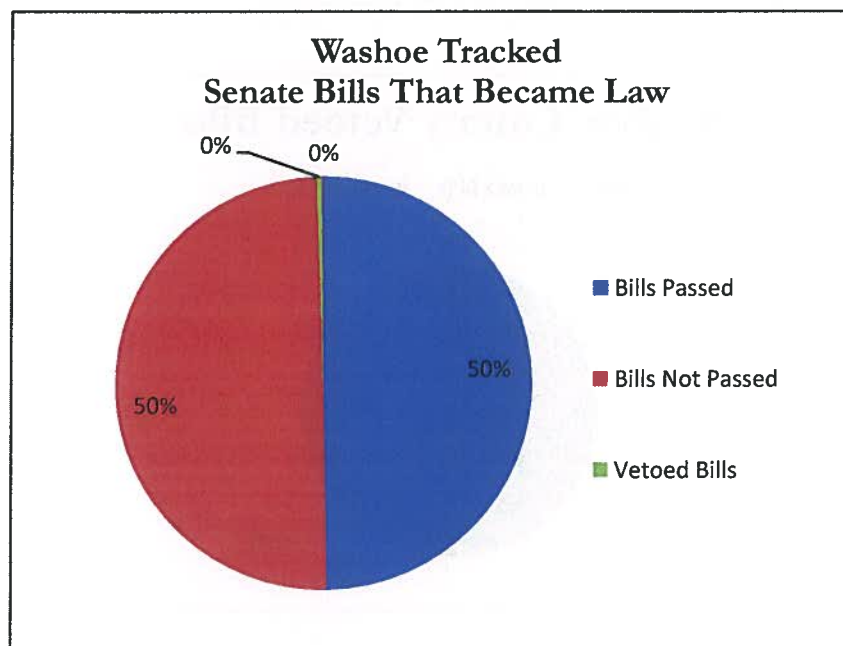

Assembly Bill 162 (Body worn cameras [BWCs])

Effective January 1, 2016

Why the change: National trend

- AB162 requires certain law enforcement agencies to adopt policies and procedures relating to the use of portable event recording devices
 - L/E agencies may require officers to wear body cameras on duty
 - If L/E agency does require, it must have policies in place which limit the use of BWCs in certain circumstances spelled out in NRS 289.

Why the change: National trend of UAV use and possible abuse by government agencies

- AB239 authorizes a law enforcement agency to operate an unmanned aerial vehicle without a warrant:
 - (1) if exigent circumstances exist and there is probable cause to believe that a person has committed, is committing or is about to commit a crime;
 - (2) if a person consents in writing to the activity;
 - (3) for the purpose of conducting search and rescue operations;
 - (4) if the law enforcement agency believes that an imminent threat exists to the life and safety of an individual person or to the public at large, including the threat of an act of terrorism; and
 - (5) upon the declaration of a state of emergency or disaster by the Governor.

Assembly Bill 173 (Private investigators/information security professionals)

Effective October 1, 2015.

Why the change: InfoSec personnel were unintentionally bound by private investigation standards, certification and oversight in NRS

- A bill passed last session had an unintended consequence of requiring our T/S InfoSec personnel to be governed by the P.I. board. AB173 exempts our Tech Services professionals who provide information security from regulation as a private investigator.

Senate Bill 111 (Body worn cameras [BWCs])

Effective June 11, 2015.

Why the change: National trend

- SB111 was amended to only apply to the Department of Public Safety, Nevada Highway Patrol for the mandated use of BWCs by uniformed officers on duty.
- The bill requires that NHP must have policies in place which limit the use of BWCs in certain circumstances spelled out in NRS 480.

Senate Bill 147 (Dog training for police)

Effective October 1, 2015.

Why the change: There is a perception that law enforcement officers are unnecessarily killing family pets and that the officers cannot accurately determine aggressive versus non-aggressive behavior of dogs.

- SB147 requires each law enforcement agency to adopt policies setting forth when a peace officer who is employed by the agency is required to be trained in effective responses to incidents involving dogs or where dogs are present.

Senate Bill 285 (Constables, civil matters)

Effective June 9, 2015.

Why the change: (1) Constable regulation in Clark County and (2) if Sheriff's do a civil execution on a liquor store or bar and end up with all of the alcohol, they technically could not sell it since Sheriff's Offices do not possess a liquor license. This law exempts Sheriff's from needing a liquor license for that purpose.

- SB285 makes changes to constables and their duties and some Sheriff's duties regarding civil matters.
 - Under existing law, the sheriff of a county may authorize a constable to receive and execute the process, writs or warrants of courts of justice, judicial officers and coroners that have been delivered to the sheriff. Now, such orders may be delivered directly to a constable who then must execute the orders.
 - Requires certification as a category II peace officer of the constable and each deputy constable of a township whose population: (1) is 100,000 or more, if the township is in a county whose population is 700,000 or more (currently Clark County); and (2) is 250,000 or more, if the township is in a county whose population is less than 700,000 (currently all counties other than Clark County).
 - Provides that a constable or deputy constable has the powers of a peace officer: (1) for the discharge of duties that are prescribed by law; (2) for the purpose of arresting a person in certain circumstances who has committed or attempted to commit a public offense in the presence of the constable or deputy constable; (3) in an area that is within the limits of an incorporated city, for the additional purposes authorized by and with the consent of the chief of police of the city; and (4) in an area that is not within the limits of an incorporated city, for the additional purposes authorized by and with the consent of the sheriff of the county.
 - Prohibits a constable or deputy constable from carrying a firearm in the performance of his or her duties unless: (1) the constable has adopted a written policy on the use of deadly force; and (2) the constable and each deputy constable has received training regarding the policy. A constable or deputy constable authorized to carry a firearm pursuant to section 13 must receive training approved by the Commission in the use of firearms at least once every 6 months.
 - Requires proper identification on the uniform and tightens up the fees Constables may charge.
- Existing law generally authorizes the sale of liquor only under certain circumstances and only by a person who holds the appropriate license issued by the Department of Taxation. Chapter 369 of NRS will now exempt from the licensure requirements a sheriff or constable who sells or offers for sale liquor at a sale under execution.

Firearms/ Weapons

Senate Bill 175 (Omnibus firearms bill)

Effective June 2, 2015

Why the change: National trend for “stand your ground” laws; Adding domestic violence convicted persons as a prohibitor under NRS 202.360 and other domestic violence protections; Nevada citizens’ desire to have firearms regulated at the State level and not at the local level; CCW reciprocity changes.

- SB175 makes statutory changes to “justifiable homicide,” who can/cannot possess firearms and who can/cannot regulate firearms and ammunition
 - NRS 200.120 revises the definition of “justifiable homicide” to include specifically the killing of a person in defense of an occupied motor vehicle or in defense against any person who manifestly intends and endeavors to enter the occupied motor vehicle of another for the purpose of assaulting a person who is in the motor vehicle.
 - NRS 200.130 deals with the fears of a reasonable person to justify a killing. This bill establishes a rebuttable presumption that a killing is justifiable under the standard set forth in NRS 200.130 if the person killing:
 - (1) knew or reasonably believed that the person who was killed was entering unlawfully and with force, or attempting to enter unlawfully and with force, the habitation or property of another;
 - (2) knew or reasonably believed that the person who was killed was committing or attempting to commit a crime of violence; and
 - (3) did not provoke the person who was killed.
- Existing law prohibits certain persons from owning or having in their possession or under their custody or control any firearm and that a person who violates such a provision is guilty of a category B felony. (NRS 202.360)
 - This bill adds to such a list of persons a person who has been convicted in this State or any other state of a misdemeanor crime of domestic violence as defined in federal law 18 U.S.C. § 921(a)(33). That law reads in part:
 - the term “misdemeanor crime of domestic violence” means an offense that—
 - (i) is a misdemeanor under Federal, State, or Tribal [3] law; and
 - (ii) has, as an element, the use or attempted use of physical force, or the threatened use of a deadly weapon, committed by a current or former spouse, parent, or guardian of the victim, by a person with whom the victim shares a child in common, by a person who is cohabiting with or has cohabited with the victim as a spouse, parent, or guardian, or by a person similarly situated to a spouse, parent, or guardian of the victim.
 - This change will cover those persons convicted of domestic battery under NRS 200.485.
- The new change provides that if an extended protection order is issued, the adverse party is prohibited from purchasing or otherwise acquiring any firearm during the period that the extended order is in effect. A person who violates such a provision is guilty of a category B felony.
- For CCW permits, this bill requires the DPS to determine whether each other state requires a person to complete any training, class or program for purposes of preparing the reciprocity list.
- Current NRS provides that the Legislature reserves for itself such rights and powers as are necessary to regulate the transfer, sale, purchase, possession, ownership, transportation, registration and licensing of firearms and ammunition in this State, and further provides that no county, city or town may infringe upon those rights and powers. The new law nullifies any local level firearms laws that are inconsistent with NRS and provides for civil remedy for persons adversely affected by invalid local gun laws.

Senate Bill 176 (Switchblades/other knives)

Effective July 1, 2015

Why the change: National trend to remove the stigma of “switchblades” as knives that are worse than any other knife. Proponents claim that national hysteria in the 1960’s caused switchblades and other knives to be banned across the nation. The change adds pneumatic guns (airsoft, BB, pellet, paintball) to the list of prohibited firearms that can be possessed on school property or carried concealed.

- This bill removes dirks, daggers, knives which are made an integral part of a belt buckle and switchblade knives from the list of deadly weapons in NRS 202.350 and which would require a permit to carry concealed.
- It adds pneumatic guns to NRS 202.350 – weapons which may not be carried concealed without a permit.

Senate Bill 240 (Firearms laws/mental health reporting/background checks)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: To reduce shooting incidents by mentally ill persons and further prevent possession of firearms by prohibited persons. The Central Repository is not getting records of mental health dispositions so that they can enter this info into the NICS (and in the future NCIC) database and help prevent persons with mental health conditions from obtaining firearms.

- This bill requires mental health court records to be transmitted to the Central Repository within 5 business days.
- Info placed into NICS may now be placed into NCIC. This will hopefully allow for the street cops to become aware of a firearms possession prohibitor.
- Court conviction dispositions must now be submitted to DPS within 60 days.
- Adds a person who has entered a plea of guilty but mentally ill, has been found guilty but mentally ill or has been acquitted by reason of insanity from possessing or having custody or control of a firearm.
- Adds prohibitions for “straw purchases” of firearms.
- Adds “member of a criminal gang” to persons who cannot receive a firearm.
- Current NRS provides that the Legislature reserves for itself such rights and powers as are necessary to regulate the transfer, sale, purchase, possession, ownership, transportation, registration and licensing of firearms and ammunition in this State, and further provides that no county, city or town may infringe upon those rights and powers. The new law nullifies any local level firearms laws that are inconsistent with NRS and provides for civil remedy for persons adversely affected by invalid local gun laws.

Assembly Bill 167 (Foster care firearms possession)

Effective June 10, 2015

Why the change: Law enforcement officers and CCW holders want to be foster parents but found that the prior requirements were too restrictive or would not allow them to easily protect themselves or others.

- This bill also authorizes a law enforcement officer or person who holds a permit to carry a concealed firearm to carry a firearm on his or her person while in the presence of a foster child if the person:
 - (1) keeps the firearm in a holster or other similarly secure case;
 - (2) carries the firearm in a manner which ensures that the firearm is inaccessible to the foster child and is in the possession or control of the provider or other person;
 - (3) returns the firearm to a locked secure storage container when it is not being carried or in use.

Traffic Laws

Senate Bill 2 (80 mph speed limit)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: People just want to drive fast

- Existing law makes it unlawful for a person to drive or operate a vehicle of any kind at certain speeds in certain conditions and, in any event, at a rate of speed greater than 75 miles per hour. (NRS 484B.600) Existing law also allows the Department of Transportation to establish a speed limit on the highways it constructs or maintains of not more than 75 miles per hour. (NRS 484B.613)
- Sections 1 and 2 of this bill increase the maximum speed at which a person may drive or operate a vehicle from 75 miles per hour to 80 miles per hour, subject to the existing limitations.
- DMV will figure out what roadways can handle this.

Senate Bill 142 (Trimobiles/ motorcycle helmets)

Effective May 15, 2015

Why the change: Some people just don't like wearing helmets

- Existing law defines a trimobile to mean a motor vehicle designed to travel with three wheels on the ground, two of which are power driven.
- This bill revises the definition of a trimobile to provide that at least one of the wheels must be power driven and excludes from the definition a motorcycle with a sidecar.
- These are currently known as the Can-Am Spyder and the Polaris Slingshot.
- Helmets are not required on trimobiles.

Senate Bill 144 (Pedestrian safety zones)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Increase pedestrian and child safety

- This bill authorizes the governing body of a local government or the Department of Transportation to designate pedestrian safety zones on a highway if certain findings are made
- Provides for a double penalty for traffic violations in the zone (court discretion).
- This bill makes it unlawful for a driver to make a U-turn or to overtake and pass another vehicle in a school zone or a school crossing zone when the school speed limit is in effect and children are present.

Senate Bill 156 (Roadblock safety)

Effective July 1, 2015

Why the change: Increase officer and driver safety on roadways that have been blocked by law enforcement.

- Under existing law, police officers may establish temporary roadblocks upon the highways of this State to control traffic at or near the scene of a potential or existing emergency or hazard. Under SB156, a person who unlawfully proceeds through a temporary roadblock shall be punished for a gross misdemeanor, or for a category B felony if the person is the direct cause of a death or substantial bodily harm to any person or damage to property in excess of \$1,000.
- This bill provides that a person who unlawfully proceeds through a temporary roadblock that is established because of flooding or water on the roadway is liable for the expenses of any emergency response that is required to:
 - (1) remove the driver or any passenger from the vehicle;
 - (2) move or remove the vehicle from the roadway or any area near the roadway where the vehicle creates a hazard; or
 - (3) both (1) and (2).
- A person is immune from liability for such expenses if the person unlawfully proceeds through a temporary roadblock for the purpose of making a good faith effort to assist another person who is or appears to be in danger as a result of flooding or water on the roadway.

Senate Bill 245 (Hit and run felony enhancement)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: The way the current laws are structured there is an incentive for persons who are drunk and crash into someone to flee the scene. First, they might get away with it completely. Second, they can claim to be distraught and, thus, went and had a few drinks. Third, if DUI can't be proven, the penalty is way less than a felony DUI with bodily harm or death.

- This bill increases the maximum term of imprisonment for a person who leaves the scene of an accident that results in bodily injury to or the death of a person from 15 years to 20 years, thereby making the penalties the same for leaving the scene of such an accident and driving under the influence of alcohol or a prohibited substance and proximately causing substantial bodily harm to or the death of another person.
- It also provides that such a person commits a separate offense for each person who is injured or dies in the accident and no probation may be granted.
- The "last gulp" defense is eliminated with this law also. (NRS 484C.430 1.c)

Senate Bill 354 (Pedestrians/wheel chairs in bike lanes)

Effective January, 2016

Why the change: It is currently illegal for pedestrians and wheelchairs to be in the roadway and they would technically have to turn around and go back to the nearest crosswalk and cross the street if they found the sidewalk impassable.

This change allows them to use the roadway or bike lane.

- This bill authorizes a pedestrian to travel onto the adjacent highway if a short section of the sidewalk is impassable or missing.
- A person in a wheelchair or motorized wheelchair is considered a pedestrian.

Senate Bill 404 (Moped registration)

Effective January, 2017

Why the change: mopeds are everywhere and are in fact motor vehicles using the roadways and causing all of the regular problems (if not more) similar to other motor vehicles. mopeds are currently exempt from being registered so they cannot be tracked by law enforcement. Also, because of this, they are stolen at a very high rate. This change will require a one-time registration of the moped by each owner.

- This bill requires the owner of a moped to register the moped once with the Department.
- The fee for registration is \$33
- There is also a license plate fee and an inspection fee, and the owner must pay for 1 year of the governmental services tax based on the value of the moped at the time of registration.
- A moped registration is valid until the owner transfers the ownership of the moped or cancels the registration and surrenders the license plate to the Department.
- Insurance is still not required for mopeds. Remember that a driver's license still is!
- The moped license plates will be unique to mopeds.

Assembly Bill 67 (DUI)

Effective June 9, 2015

Why the change: Changes to case law and challenges to "actual physical control" of a motor vehicle or vessel.

- This bill provides that a person shall be deemed **not to be in actual physical control** of a vehicle if:
 - (1) the person is asleep inside the vehicle;
 - (2) the person is not in the driver's seat of the vehicle;
 - (3) the engine of the vehicle is not running;
 - (4) the vehicle is lawfully parked; **AND**
 - (5) under the facts presented, it is evident that the person could not have driven the vehicle to the location
- A Supreme Court decision makes it so that a defendant in a misdemeanor trial can confront witnesses (not just an affidavit) just like a defendant in a felony trial.
- This bill eliminates the constitutional defect identified by the Nevada Supreme Court in *Byars v. State* and provide instead that if a person refuses to submit to an evidentiary blood test at the request of a police officer: (1) the officer may apply for a warrant or other court order directing the use of reasonable force to obtain the blood sample; and (2) the person's driver's license must be revoked for a certain period.
- It applies to controlled substances as well as alcohol and applies changes to revocations and hearings.
- It applies the same changes to operators of vessels and possession of a firearm while intoxicated.

Assembly Bill 143 (Electronic insurance verification)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Drivers may show proof of insurance from their electronic device.

- This bill authorizes an insurer to provide evidence of insurance in an electronic format that can be displayed on a mobile electronic device.
- A person who presents a mobile electronic device to another person to provide evidence of insurance assumes all liability for any resulting damage to the mobile electronic device. So, the cop receiving the device does not assume liability or responsibility for it, the person handing it over still does.
- It is a crime (against the officer) if an officer INTENTIONALLY views other information on the device.
 - So... if the iPhone is handed over with what the driver believes is the proof of insurance info on the screen but the officer receives the phone and there is actually a photo of some criminal activity on it, the officer may act on that information.
 - But, if the officer receives the phone with the insurance info on the screen and then he presses the home button, brings up the photos and starts scrolling through on a warrantless search, not only is anything found inadmissible, the officer is committing a misdemeanor crime.

Assembly Bill 188 (Colored HID headlamps)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Drivers operating vehicles with colored headlights cause a distraction to other drivers and unsafe night time driving conditions. Drivers of vehicles with colored headlights are usually using HID headlights with a very high temperature rating which is what causes the color change from white (5k to 6k) to purple (12k) to pink (30k). The problem is that the higher number is not brighter light output so the drivers will over-drive their headlight distance with their vehicle speed – reducing reaction time at night – or will resort to adjusting the headlight up to try and achieve greater light distance which blinds other drivers.

This bill is confusing in that it addresses the intensity of HID headlamps in “kelvins” when we laymen historically think about light brightness as “candlepower.”

The bottom line is that “white HID lights” will be legal and the bluish, purplish to pink lights will not.

- A motor vehicle may be equipped with high-intensity discharge headlamps provided that such headlamps have a correlated color temperature of not less than 5,000 kelvins and not more than 6,000 kelvins.
 - This is the DOT approved kelvin range for OEM headlights on factory built vehicles.
- This bill provides the same limitations on the headlamp or headlamps on a motorcycle or moped.

Assembly Bill 385 (Tow trucks/penalty for noncompliance)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Money. Insurance companies want the vehicles they insure to be towed to the correct location after an accident or other law enforcement related reason.

Currently, in NRS 706.4489, if a law enforcement officer requests that an operator of a tow car tow a vehicle following an accident or following recovery after having been stolen and the vehicle is not otherwise subject to impoundment, **the law enforcement officer shall make a good faith effort to determine the identity of the insurance company that provides coverage for the vehicle.** If the law enforcement officer determines the identity of the insurance company, he or she shall inform the operator of the tow car of the identity of the insurance company.

In this change **if** the law enforcement officer does not inform the operator of the tow car of the identity of the insurance company, **the operator of the tow car shall make a good faith effort to determine the identity of the insurance company from the law enforcement officer and the owner or operator of the vehicle.**

- Existing law authorizes an insurance company to designate vehicle storage lots to which certain vehicles insured by the insurance company must be towed under certain circumstances.
- This bill prohibits an operator of a tow car from:
 - (1) towing a vehicle to a location other than a vehicle storage lot designated by the insurance company that provides coverage for the vehicle unless the owner or operator of the vehicle directs the operator of the tow car to tow the vehicle to a location that is not a vehicle storage lot.
 - (2) seeking authorization from an owner or operator of a vehicle to tow the vehicle to a location other than the designated vehicle storage lot and provides civil/financial penalties for doing so.
- Existing law requires a law enforcement officer to make a good faith effort to determine the identity of the insurance company that provides coverage for the vehicle before the vehicle is towed.
- This law requires the operator of a tow car to make a good faith effort to determine the identity of the insurance company that provides coverage for the vehicle if the law enforcement officer does not communicate that information to the operator.

Assembly Bill 422 (Handlebar height/moped law uniformity across the State)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Allows "ape hanger" handlebars on motorcycles and provides for consistent motorcycle laws across the State.

- This bill prohibits a local authority from enacting an ordinance governing the operation and equipment of a motorcycle or a moped which is in conflict with any existing state laws.
- This bill provides in NRS 486.201 that handlebars may extend not more than 6 inches above the driver's shoulders.

Government

Senate Bill 3 (Creates a DMV next of kin registry)

Effective May 20, 2015 for the purpose of developing regulations

Why the change: In this day and age of fast moving information, people may find out about a motor vehicle crash third-hand, without all of the facts and circumstances. Law enforcement or Coroners/Medical Examiners Offices are tasked with trying to locate next of kin in a timely manner for proper notification of death or serious bodily injury to vehicle occupants. This new law allows the DMV to create a "Next Of Kin Registry" that drivers may opt-in to and which law enforcement or Coroners/M.E.'s must search to try and make proper notification in a timely manner.

- The new law is effective May 20, 2015 so that DMV can begin to develop the program and post it on their web site.
- It will go live once DMV has all of the bugs worked out
- In the new law (once up and running) a law enforcement officer or a duly authorized employee of a law enforcement agency must, as soon as practicable, search the Next-of-Kin Registry for an emergency contact person of a driver or passenger in a motor vehicle if the driver or passenger:
 - (a) Possesses a Nevada driver's license, identification card or driver authorization card;
 - (b) Has been involved in a motor vehicle accident which results in the death, serious bodily injury or other incapacitation of the driver or passenger; and
 - (c) Is incapable of communicating.
- If the law enforcement officer or the duly authorized employee of a law enforcement agency identifies an emergency contact person of a driver or passenger through the Next-of-Kin Registry pursuant to this section, the officer or employee must make a reasonable attempt to notify the emergency contact person, as soon as practicable, of the hospital or other location at which the driver or passenger may be located.
- In the event of the **death** of a driver or passenger in a motor vehicle accident, the law enforcement officer or the duly authorized employee of a law enforcement agency shall **coordinate the notification** of the emergency contact person **with the coroner or medical examiner**, as applicable. Such notification may only be made after the positive identification of the decedent.
- This law applies to other incidents (disasters, etc.) where victims cannot communicate and might be in the registry.

Senate Bill 5 (Elections/majority vote in primary)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Shorter and less costly campaigns. Candidates for certain nonpartisan offices (Sheriff, judicial offices, school offices, etc.) who receive a majority of the votes cast in certain primary elections must be declared elected to office without being placed on the ballot at a general election.

- Per the new law, if one candidate receives a majority of the votes cast in such a primary election, the candidate is declared elected to the office and his or her name is not placed on the general election ballot.

Senate Bill 29 (Dillon's Rule)

Effective July 1, 2015

Why the change: Way back in 1868 Chief Justice John F. Dillon of the Iowa Supreme Court developed a common-law rule on local governmental power known as "Dillon's Rule," which defines and limits the powers of local governments. Under Dillon's Rule, a local government is authorized to exercise only those powers which are expressly granted by the State and, if there is any doubt as to who has the power, it is resolved in favor of the State.

This change gives some local power back to the Nevada counties for matters of local concern.

- SB29 authorizes a board of county commissioners, with certain exceptions, to exercise all powers necessary or proper to address matters of local concern for the effective operation of county government, whether or not the powers are expressly granted to the board, but such powers remain subject to all federal and state constitutional, statutory and regulatory provisions.
- SB29 modifies Dillon's Rule as applied to the board of county commissioners so that if there is any fair or reasonable doubt concerning the existence of a power of the board to address a matter of local concern, it must be presumed that the board has the power unless the presumption is rebutted by evidence of a contrary intent by the Legislature.

Senate Bill 30 (Longevity pay/county elected officers)

Effective July 1, 2015

Why the change: Fiscal responsibility; re-election.

- This bill authorizes an elected county officer to elect not to receive all or a portion of the longevity pay to which he or she is entitled for any fiscal year.

Senate Bill 482 (County elected officials' salary)

Effective July 1, 2015

Why the change: Disparity in pay between agency elected officials and their subordinates. Salaries are set in statute (NRS 245.043) and no pay increase since 2003.

- Existing law sets forth the annual compensation to be paid to district attorneys, sheriffs, county clerks, county assessors, county recorders, county treasurers and public administrators.
- This bill increases the annual compensation for those officers by 3 percent each fiscal year for Fiscal Years 2015-2016, 2016-2017, 2017-2018 and 2018-2019, unless the board of county commissioners determines that sufficient financial resources are not available to pay the increased salaries.

Assembly Bill 321 (Charter schools/school police)

Effective July 1, 2015

Why the change: Charter schools believed that they were not receiving adequate police response from school police agencies or local law enforcement.

In one circumstance, a tactical law enforcement operation necessitated the lock down of a local public elementary school. A charter school was actually closer to the tactical incident and was not notified to lock down. The local L/E agency was not aware that there was a charter school in the strip mall near the incident.

In another circumstance, a charter school called the school police department to have an officer respond to an incident. The school PD advised of no jurisdiction for the incident and suggested local law enforcement. A call to local law enforcement was met with the response that it was a school PD issue. This new law change seeks to fix the confusion.

- AB321 requires the board of trustees of a school district to enter into a contract to provide school police officers to a charter school if the governing body of a charter school makes a request for the provision of school police officers. It also provides jurisdiction for the school police.
- Requires a charter or private school to notify the primary law enforcement agency where the charter school is located of:
 - (1) the location of the charter or private school;
 - (2) the names of authorized contact persons for the school;
 - (3) the number of pupils enrolled in the school; and
 - (4) the maximum number of pupils that may enroll in the school.
- Requires a charter or private school to notify the primary law enforcement agency if the school relocates and if the name of any authorized contact person changes.
- Requires a law enforcement agency that is contacted for assistance by a public school or private school which does not have school police to respond according to the protocol of the law enforcement agency established for responding to calls for assistance from the general public.
- Requires a local law enforcement agency to consider whether it is necessary and appropriate to notify any other public school or private school of the crisis or emergency under certain circumstances and that this notification include any information necessary for the school to appropriately respond to the crisis or emergency.

Senate Bill 37 (GPS tracking of parolees)

Effective July 1, 2015

Why the change: Use of new technology; better accountability for parolees

- This bill revises provisions concerning the capabilities of an electronic device used to electronically supervise an offender to authorize the use of devices that are capable of:
 - (1) using the Global Positioning System;
 - (2) recording or transmitting information concerning the location of the person being monitored;
 - (3) producing, upon request, reports or records of the person's presence near or within a crime scene or prohibited area or his or her departure from a specified geographic location.

Senate Bill 294 (Prisoner access to phones)

Effective June 10, 2015

Why the change: ?

- This bill authorizes the Department of Corrections to enter into an agreement with an offender allowing the offender to use telecommunications devices for certain purposes related to education and employment.

Assembly Bill 11 (Pre-sentence investigation reports)

Effective May 22, 2015

Why the change: Pre-sentence investigation (PSI) reports are used to determine the appropriate sentence for convicted persons. Claims have been made that the current 21 days is too long and an unnecessary time frame to keep persons in a local facility so the PSI report is changed to 14 calendar days.

- Existing law requires the Division of Parole and Probation of the Department of Public Safety to disclose the factual content of the report of any presentence investigation and the recommendations of the Division to the prosecuting attorney, the counsel for the defendant, the defendant and the court not later than 21 working days before the defendant will be sentenced.
- AB11 decreases the time limitation for disclosure from 21 working days to 14 calendar days.

Assembly Bill 16 (Sexual conduct with prisoners)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Really?

- AB16 revises existing law to provide that a prisoner who voluntarily engages in sexual conduct with a person who is not an employee of or a contractor or volunteer for a prison is guilty of a category D felony.
- This bill provides that an employee of or a contractor or volunteer for a prison who voluntarily engages or attempts to engage in certain acts with such a prisoner, regardless of whether the prisoner consents to the act, commits either sexual abuse of a prisoner or unauthorized custodial conduct, depending on the type of act. Such an employee, contractor or volunteer who commits:
 - (1) sexual abuse of a prisoner is guilty of a category D felony;
 - (2) unauthorized custodial conduct by engaging in certain acts is guilty of a gross misdemeanor; or
 - (3) unauthorized custodial conduct by attempting to engage in certain acts is guilty of a misdemeanor.

Marijuana/Narcotics

Senate Bill 114 (Rx monitoring system)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: There is a prescription drug monitoring program (PDMP) run by the State Board of Pharmacy designed to provide information concerning the inappropriate use of controlled substances by a particular patient and statistical data relating to the use of controlled substances.

Law enforcement agencies across the State used to have limited access to the system which was removed several years back. Investigations suffered.

SB114 grants local law enforcement agencies limited and specific access to the program again.

- SB114 requires the Board to allow a law enforcement officer to have Internet access to the database of the program if the employer of the officer approves such access and certifies to the Board that the officer meets certain requirements.
 - The officer is limited to accessing the database to investigate a crime related to prescription drugs.
 - The employer of the officer is required to monitor the officer's use of the database and establish appropriate disciplinary action for any unlawful use of the database.
 - This law makes it a misdemeanor to violate the restrictions.

Senate Bill 276 (Medical marijuana)

Effective June 9, 2015

Why the change: Not all available medical marijuana certificates in the State of Nevada were allocated due to jurisdictions opting out. This bill allocates the extra certificates to the more populated jurisdictions. Also, prior law prohibited the dispensaries to move their location and since the dispensaries approved for the jurisdictions could (and did in Incline Village) end up clustered in one area, this bill allows for the moves. It also allows for the sale of the business.

- SB276 requires the Division to reallocate the certificates provided for a county which has no qualified applicants to the other counties of this State.
- It allows the transfer of ownership in a medical marijuana establishment and the transfer of a medical marijuana establishment registration certificate if the new owner:
 - (1) meets the requirements of existing law relating to liquid assets;
 - (2) submits certain information to allow the Division to perform certain background checks; and
 - (3) proves that its acquisition of the establishment will not violate certain restrictions on holding multiple establishments.
- SB276 allows an establishment to move to a new location under the jurisdiction of the same local government if, after a public hearing, the local government approves the new location.

Senate Bill 305 (Hemp cultivation)

Effective June 4, 2015

Why the change: On February 7, 2014, the President of the United States signed the Agricultural Act of 2014 into law. Section 7606 of the Act authorizes institutions of higher education and state departments of agriculture to cultivate industrial hemp for research purposes under an agricultural pilot program or for other agricultural or academic research.

- SB305 authorizes an institution of higher education or the State Department of Agriculture to grow or cultivate industrial hemp for purposes of research conducted under an agricultural pilot program or for other agricultural or academic research.
- The bill allows for regulations which restrict or prohibit the use of industrial hemp grown or cultivated to manufacture cannabidiol or any preparation of cannabidiol (found in marijuana plants).

Senate Bill 447 (Medical marijuana/concentrated cannabis)

Effective July 1, 2015

Why the change: This bill was brought by law enforcement throughout the State to clean up some issues relating to marijuana in general – not just medical marijuana (MMJ). Some loopholes were identified in the Med MJ laws passed last session like counterfeit MMJ card possession, delivery and possession of MMJ, and the ability of MMJ businesses to actually begin to operate.

Additionally, the State of Colorado has seen a huge increase in “butane hash oil” explosions from persons “legally” extracting THC from marijuana. The way that Nevada law was written, and the fact that extractions were considered marijuana, the extractions and the process could have been legal for medical purposes and legal across the board if recreational marijuana becomes legal in this State. The fix is to make the extraction and any byproduct of it illegal still, whether medical or recreational MJ.

Finally, the past legislation did not allow for MMJ use by a minor under the care of a parent or guardian.

- SB447 makes it unlawful to:
 - (1) counterfeit or forge or attempt to counterfeit or forge a letter of approval; or
 - (2) possess with the intent to use any such counterfeit or forged registry identification card or letter of approval.
- This bill defines certain terms, including “concentrated cannabis,” and revise the definition of marijuana for the purposes of regulating controlled substances.
- ***Officers and prosecutors should learn the term “concentrated cannabis.” Hash, hash oil, butter, BHO, 710 and all of the other slang terms should now be referred to as *concentrated cannabis* in reports and testimony.
- This bill revises the quantities of marijuana and concentrated cannabis for the purposes of the prohibition against trafficking; specifically down to 50lbs (from 100 lbs.) for marijuana and one pound for concentrated cannabis.
- It requires the Division to issue a “letter of approval” to an applicant who is under 10 years of age within restrictions and conditions and under a caregiver.
- The custodial parent or legal guardian of a child under the age of 10 years who obtains a letter of approval to agree to serve as the designated primary caregiver for the child and gives specific authorizations.
- An employee of the State Department of Agriculture who possesses, delivers or produces marijuana in the course of his or her duties is exempt from certain offenses relating to marijuana.
- SB447- like SB276 - allows a medical marijuana establishment to move to a new location under the jurisdiction of the same local government if the local government approves the new location.
- Finally, SB447 allows a medical marijuana establishment to use certain pesticides in the cultivation and production of marijuana, edible marijuana products and marijuana-infused products.

Assembly Bill 70 (Marijuana taxation)

Effective July 1, 2015

Why the change: Gotta cover the costs...

- AB70 requires an agency of a local government (read that as Washoe County, City of Reno, City of Sparks, etc.) that performs inspections, reviews or other tasks related to ensuring that a medical marijuana establishment complies with all applicable local governmental ordinances or rules to maintain records of:
 - (1) the hours its employees spend on these inspections, reviews and tasks;
 - (2) the rate of pay of such employees; and
 - (3) the share of any costs for equipment for the agency attributable to the establishment.
- requires the agency to provide these records to the establishment within 30 days after performing such inspections, reviews or tasks and **requires the establishment to pay a fee to the agency equal to the actual costs** of the agency to perform the inspections, reviews and tasks.
- requires that the proceeds of such a fee be expended only to pay the costs to perform such inspections, reviews and tasks and prohibits the proceeds from supplanting other support for the agency.

Assembly Bill 371 (Destruction of excess marijuana)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Marijuana stinks. A lot of marijuana stinks a lot.

- AB371 authorizes a law enforcement agency that has seized such a substance to destroy any amount of the substance that exceeds 10 pounds without court approval if the law enforcement agency:
 - (1) weighs the substance;
 - (2) takes and retains certain samples of the substance for evidentiary purposes; and
 - (3) takes photographs that reasonably demonstrate the total amount of the substance.

Criminal Justice/Courts/Crime

Senate Bill 52 (Electronic search warrants/emergency interception)

Effective June 9, 2015

Why the change: To move search warrant applications and communications into modern technology and methods. Once a system is established, officers will be able to obtain search warrants via handheld or mobile devices. Additionally, this bill provides interception and access to suspect devices in limited emergency circumstances such as barricaded, hostage and threatened use of explosives.

- SB52 authorizes the use of secure electronic transmission for the submission of an application and affidavit for, and the issuance by a magistrate of, a search warrant.
- Existing law authorizes the interception of **wire or oral** communications. This bill additionally provides for an order authorizing the interception of an **electronic communication**.
- Provides that a provider of electronic communication service, a public utility and associated persons are immune from any liability relating to the interception of a wire, electronic or oral communication made pursuant to such a court order.
- Provides that the interception, listening or recording of a wire, electronic or oral communication by a peace officer or certain other persons is not unlawful if the peace officer or person is intercepting the communication of a person who has:
 - (1) barricaded himself or herself, resulting in an imminent risk of harm to the life of another person;
 - (2) created a hostage situation; or
 - (3) threatened the imminent illegal use of an explosive.
- This bill authorizes the Nevada Supreme Court and the district courts of this State to issue orders requiring a provider of electronic communication service to disclose the contents of a wire or electronic communication or a record or other information pertaining to a subscriber to, or customer of, such service upon the application of a district attorney or the Attorney General, or their deputies, supported by an affidavit of a peace officer under the circumstances and upon the conditions prescribed by federal law.
- Provides that a provider of electronic communication service and associated persons are immune from any liability relating to a disclosure made pursuant to such a court order.

Senate Bill 56 (Graffiti)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Taggers don't just paint walls and fences anymore... they paint livestock, cars, and etch into plate glass windows and other very expensive items to replace. Also, some property owners just don't care so graffiti will stay displayed forever. Changes in this bill cover those and other concerns.

- SB56 revises the definition of "graffiti" to:
 - (1) clarify that estrays and livestock are included within the scope of property to which the offense of graffiti applies; and
 - (2) exclude certain items which are affixed to property.
- This bill revises the definition of "graffiti implement" to include any item that may be used to etch or deface property. So not only paint and markers but also carbide tipped instruments or other etching items and even some stickers or similarly applied items (not Post-It notes, garage sale signs or easily removed items).
- It authorizes the payment of restitution to a governmental entity for future expenses to abate the graffiti and that a governmental entity may also bring a civil action to recover such damages from a person who placed graffiti on property if the governmental entity owns or is otherwise responsible for the damaged property.
- Existing law authorizes a board of county commissioners to provide by ordinance for the covering or removal of certain graffiti on certain types of property and nonresidential property. (NRS 244.36935) This bill revises provisions governing the covering or removal of certain graffiti that is placed on residential property and nonresidential property and authorizes the governing body of a city to similarly provide by ordinance for the covering or removal of certain graffiti on residential property and nonresidential property.

Senate Bill 138 (Seizure/forfeiture reporting requirements)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: To legitimize law enforcements seizure and forfeiture efforts, and to provide consistency and transparency throughout the State.

- SB138 requires each law enforcement agency to submit an annual report containing certain information relating to the seizure, forfeiture and disposition of property to the Office of the Attorney General.
- Requires a plaintiff to file a complaint for forfeiture within 120 days after property has been seized if the property was seized without process.
- Prohibits the forfeiture of property seized by a law enforcement agency unless:
 - (1) the agency files a complaint for forfeiture in the district court for the county in which such property is located; or
 - (2) a stipulated agreement between the parties is reached.
- Requires that, if a criminal trial is pending, an order staying a proceeding for forfeiture remains in effect until the completion of the criminal trial.
- Requires seized property to be returned to a claimant if the criminal charges against the claimant have been denied or dismissed.
- Provides for the forfeiture of property through a claimant's plea or a stipulated agreement reached between the claimant and the plaintiff.

Senate Bill 160 (Trespassing/Base jumping)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: This bill makes changes to the liability of property owners vs. trespassers.

More importantly for law enforcement is that there is a new section added to NRS 207 which makes base jumping illegal – a category E felony.

- This bill:
 - (1) provides that a person who jumps or otherwise removes himself or herself, by parachute or by other airborne means, from a fixed structure owned by another person or a person who knowingly delivers or retrieves another person who intends to commit, is committing or has committed such an act is deemed a trespasser; and
 - (2) provides that a person who violates this law is guilty of a category E felony.

Senate Bill 191 (Recovery and return of seized property)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Law enforcement has the authority to lawfully seize property. Property owners have a right to have it back in a timely manner.

- Existing law sets forth a procedure by which a person who is aggrieved by an unlawful search and seizure of his or her property may move a court for the return of the property and the suppression of its use as evidence. (NRS 179.085) This bill establishes a procedure by which a person who is aggrieved by the seizure and deprivation of property under certain other circumstances may move a court for the return of the property.

Senate Bill 197 (False liens)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Public figures, elected officials, and even those of us that deal directly with the public on a daily basis will sometimes have a differing opinion of a matter than the person we are dealing with. A differing of opinion or belief system may result in a million dollar fraudulent lien against an officer, his family, his property and his dog.

- SB197 prohibits a person from filing, registering, recording or presenting, in any public office, a lien or other encumbrance against the property of a public officer, candidate for public office, public employee or participant in an official proceeding or a member of the immediate family of such persons, if the lien or encumbrance is forged or fraudulently altered, contains a false statement of material fact or is filed, registered, recorded or presented in bad faith for the purpose of harassing or defrauding such persons.
- A person who violates this law is guilty of a category B felony and may be punished by imprisonment in the state prison for not less than 2 years or by a fine of not more than \$20,000, or both.
- If the person commits a second or subsequent offense, or engages in a pattern or practice of filing such liens or encumbrances, the person may be punished by imprisonment in the state prison for up to 20 years or a fine of up to \$150,000, or both.
- It also provides a civil penalty of \$20,000 for each violation and authorizes a person to bring a civil action for damages suffered and attorney's fees and costs.

Senate Bill 464 (Alcohol overdose immunity/powdered alcohol)

Effective May 29, 2015

Why the change: This bill was presented by the Nevada Youth Legislature as their one bill to bring forth this session. The youth felt that too many underage drinkers would not report a medical emergency relating to excessive alcohol consumption and/or would flee the scene once first responders were called. They believed this created additional safety issues for the already intoxicated persons and that the remedy is to offer immunity to a person (intoxicated or not) who is the first person who calls for help. This immunity from arrest applies only to the first caller who stays on the line and/or on scene and also to the intoxicated individual; not any of the other intoxicated individuals... The legislators agreed. It will be responding law enforcement officers' challenge to determine the first caller if there are more than one.

Amended into this bill is a provision outlawing "powdered alcohol."

- SB464 provides an exemption from criminal liability for consumption or possession of alcohol if a person under 21 years of age requests emergency medical assistance for himself, herself or another person in certain circumstances.
- Such an exemption only applies for a person who makes the request on behalf of another person if he or she:
 - (1) reasonably believes that the person who may need such assistance is under 21 years of age;
 - (2) reasonably believes the person needs such assistance;
 - (3) is the first person to request emergency medical assistance for the person;
 - (4) remains with the person requiring such assistance; and
 - (5) cooperates with providers of emergency medical assistance, health care providers and law enforcement.
- A person for whom such a request for assistance is made is also exempt from those criminal penalties.
- This bill prohibits a person from selling, offering for sale or otherwise distributing or purchasing, possessing or using powdered alcohol.

Assembly Bill 8 (Child welfare/Craigslist adoptions)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: This bill makes statutory changes to address current technology regarding adoption or placement of children. It also addresses a growing and unfortunate trend of parents offering their children up on Craigslist (or similar sites) for some sort of pseudo-adoption. The bill also addresses the matter of child restrains in the courtroom.

- Existing law provides that any person or organization who advertises in any periodical or newspaper, or by radio or other public medium, that the person or organization will place children for adoption or accept, supply, provide or obtain children for adoption is guilty of a misdemeanor. (NRS 127.310) This bill specifically applies this prohibition to a person or organization who advertises through a computerized communication system, including, without limitation, electronic mail, an Internet website or an Internet account.
- AB8 prohibits the use of an instrument of restraint on a child during a court proceeding, unless the restraint is necessary to prevent the child from inflicting harm on himself or herself or another person or to prevent the child from escaping the courtroom.
- AB8 enacts provisions prohibiting the trafficking of children.
 - a person shall not recruit, transport, transfer, harbor, provide, obtain, maintain or solicit a child in furtherance of a transaction, or advertise or facilitate a transaction, pursuant to which a parent of a child or a person with custody of a child places the child in the physical custody of another person who is not related to the child, for the purpose of permanently avoiding or divesting himself or herself of responsibility for the child.
 - certain placements of a child are not prohibited, including, without limitation, the placement of a child with a relative or stepparent, the placement of a child with or by a licensed child-placing agency or agency which provides child welfare services and the placement of a child with a person that is approved by a court of competent jurisdiction.
 - It is a category C felony for violation.

Assembly Bill 49 (Sex crimes)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: This bill makes numerous changes to a variety of sexual crimes, to include adding “revenge porn” which is the dissemination of intimate images, and adjusting some ages and various penalties in the sex-related statutes.

This is a very involved bill with many changes... too numerous to summarize.

- AB49 establishes the crime of unlawful dissemination of an intimate image of a person.
- Defines the term “intimate image” generally as a photograph, film, videotape or other recorded image, or any reproduction thereof, which depicts:
 - (1) the fully exposed nipple of the female breast of another person; or
 - (2) one or more persons engaged in sexual conduct.
- AB49 also provides that an image which would otherwise constitute an intimate image is not an intimate image if the person depicted in the image:
 - (1) is not clearly identifiable;
 - (2) voluntarily exposed himself or herself in a public or commercial setting; or
 - (3) is a public figure.
- A person commits the crime of unlawful dissemination of an intimate image and is guilty of a category D felony when, with the intent to harass, harm or terrorize another person, the person electronically disseminates or sells an intimate image which depicts the other person and the other person:
 - (1) did not give prior consent to the electronic dissemination or sale;
 - (2) had a reasonable expectation that the intimate image would be kept private and would not be made visible to the public; and
 - (3) was at least 18 years of age when the intimate image was created.
- A person is guilty of a category D felony if he or she demands payment of money, property, services or anything else of value from a person in exchange for removing an intimate image from public view.
- AB49 provides that a person who commits a sexual penetration upon a child under the age of 14 years or causes a child under the age of 14 years to make a sexual penetration on himself or herself or another, or on a beast, is guilty of sexual assault.
- It further provides that, except in certain circumstances, such provisions do not apply to a person who commits any such act upon a child under the age of 14 years if the person committing the act is less than 18 years of age and is not more than 2 years older than the person upon whom the act is committed.
- Existing law also provides that a person who commits any act of open or gross lewdness or who makes any open and indecent or obscene exposure of his or her person, or of the person of another, is guilty of a gross misdemeanor for the first offense and a category D felony for any subsequent offense. (NRS 201.210, 201.220) Under this bill, if a person commits any such offense and he or she has previously been convicted of a sexual offense, or if the person commits any such offense in the presence of a child under the age of 18 years or a vulnerable person, the person is guilty of a category D felony.
- Additionally, under existing law, a person who commits certain acts with a child under the age of 14 years is guilty of lewdness with a child and is guilty of a category A felony. (NRS 201.230) This bill provides that a person is guilty of lewdness with a child if the person:
 - (1) is 18 years of age or older and commits certain acts with a child under the age of 16 years; or
 - (2) is under the age of 18 years and commits certain acts with a child under the age of 14 years.
- It also provides that if a person commits lewdness with:
 - (1) a child under the age of 14, he or she is guilty of a category A felony; and
 - (2) a child who is 14 or 15, he or she is guilty of a category B felony.
- Changes are made to the definition of the term “statutory sexual seduction” to: *ordinary sexual intercourse, anal intercourse, or sexual penetration committed by a person 18 years of age or older with a person who is 14 or 15 years of age and who is at least 4 years younger than the perpetrator.*
- Other parts of this bill revise the penalties imposed for the crime of statutory sexual seduction and make changes to expert testimony witnesses and other evidence.

Assembly Bill 83 (Seizing cigarette rolling machines)

Effective June 9, 2015

Why the change: "Cigarette rolling machines" have been added to the definition of a tobacco manufacturer. Section 9 of this bill adds that term to existing language in NRS 370 but what stands out is the not-well-known provisions of NRS 370.415: We (law enforcement) can not only seize tax stamps, contraband tobacco products and machinery, and now cigarette rolling machines... but if we do, we must report this to the Department of Taxation within 5 business days.

- NRS 370.415 is hereby amended to read as follows:
 - (1) The Department, its agents, sheriffs within their respective counties and all other peace officers of the State of Nevada shall seize any counterfeit stamps, contraband tobacco products, machinery used to manufacture contraband tobacco products and cigarette rolling machines being used in violation of any provision of this chapter that are found or located in the State of Nevada.
 - (2) A sheriff or other peace officer who seizes stamps, contraband tobacco products, machinery or cigarette rolling machines pursuant to this section shall provide written notification of the seizure to the Department not later than 5 working days after the seizure. The notification must include the reason for the seizure.

Assembly Bill 108 (Sex trafficking victims/trespass convictions)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Sex trafficking victims are often arrested for trespass, loitering or similar criminal offenses simply to get them off of the property where they are forced to work. This places them into the revolving cycle of the criminal justice system rather than providing for a way out of the sex trafficking lifestyle. This bill allows for the court to vacate a judgement to allow for non-judicial intervention strategies.

- Existing law allows a court to grant a motion to vacate a judgment if the defendant was convicted of engaging in or soliciting prostitution and the defendant's participation in the offense was the result of having been a victim of sex trafficking or involuntary servitude. (NRS 176.515)
- This bill allows a court to grant a motion to vacate a judgment if the defendant was convicted of:
 - (1) trespassing, loitering in a gaming area or a violation of a county, city or town ordinance prohibiting loitering for the purpose of solicitation or prostitution; and
 - (2) the defendant's participation in the offense was the result of having been a victim of sex trafficking or involuntary servitude.

Assembly Bill 124 (Punishment for crimes – raised from 8 to 10 yoa)

Effective October 1, 2015

- Under existing law, the minimum age at which a child may be punished for a crime is 8 years of age. (NRS 194.010) This bill raises the minimum age at which a child may be punished to 10 years of age unless the child is charged with murder or certain sexual offenses.

Assembly Bill 179 (Personally identifiable information)

Effective July 1, 2015

- This bill expands the definition of “personal information” to include such items of information as electronic mail addresses and passwords, driver’s authorization card numbers, medical and health insurance identification numbers and other similar information. (Chapter 603A of NRS)

Assembly Bill 193 (Preliminary hearings, hearsay and video testimony)

Effective October 1, 2015

- Existing law sets forth the requirements for conducting a preliminary examination. (NRS 171.196) Section 1 of this bill authorizes the use of certain hearsay evidence in a preliminary examination under certain circumstances.
- Existing law allows a witness to testify at a preliminary examination or before a grand jury through the use of audiovisual technology under certain circumstances by filing a request, subject to an objection by the opposing party and court approval, before the preliminary examination or grand jury proceeding. This bill requires the court to allow a witness to testify at a preliminary examination or before a grand jury through the use of audiovisual technology under certain circumstances.

Assembly Bill 212 (Statute of limitations for sexual assault)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Testimony from many witnesses at the legislative hearing provided that many years can go by before victims of sexual assault realize that they might not be the only person that was victimized by an individual or other circumstances that cause the testimony to be presented and an investigation to be initiated.

- Existing law requires that criminal proceedings for sexual assault must commence, by way of indictment, criminal information or complaint, within 4 years after the commission of the offense. (NRS 171.085) This bill provides that a prosecution for sexual assault must be commenced within **20 years** after the commission of the offense.

Assembly Bill 214 (Soliciting a child)

Effective May 27, 2015

Why the change: Because some predators just don’t get it.

- Existing law provides that a person who solicits a child for prostitution is guilty of a category E felony. (NRS 201.354) Section 3 of this bill increases the penalty for this offense to make:
 - (1) the first offense a category E felony punishable by the penalties applicable to other category E felonies and a mandatory fine of not more than \$5,000;
 - (2) the second offense a category D felony punishable by the penalties applicable to other category D felonies; and
 - (3) the third and subsequent offense a category C felony punishable by the penalties applicable to other category C felonies but no probation or suspended sentence.

Assembly Bill 223 (Crimes against older/vulnerable persons)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Existing law sets forth provisions concerning the abuse, neglect, exploitation or isolation of older persons and vulnerable persons. This bill generally adds **abandonment** of older persons and vulnerable persons to such provisions and makes other definition changes.

- AB223 defines the term “abandonment” to mean the:
 - (1) desertion of an older person or a vulnerable person in an unsafe manner by a caretaker or other person with a legal duty of care; or
 - (2) withdrawal of necessary assistance owed to an older person or a vulnerable person by a caretaker or other person with an obligation to provide services to the older person or vulnerable person.
- the term “abuse” includes:
 - (1) infliction of psychological or emotional anguish, pain or distress on an older person or a vulnerable person through any act;
 - (2) nonconsensual sexual contact with an older person or a vulnerable person; and
 - (3) permitting acts which constitute abuse to be committed against an older person or a vulnerable person.
- the term “isolation” includes permitting acts which constitute isolation to be committed against an older person or a vulnerable person.
- Revises the definition of the term “undue influence” for purposes of the definition of the term “exploitation,” and revises the definition of the term “protective services” to include services provided to an older person or a vulnerable person who is unable to provide for his or her own needs.
- Existing law also requires that reports made concerning the abuse, neglect, exploitation or isolation of an older person or a vulnerable person, and records and investigations relating to those reports, are confidential, and a person, law enforcement agency or public or private agency, institution or facility can release data or information concerning the reports and investigation only in certain limited circumstances. this bill provides that if data or information concerning the reports and investigation is made available in such circumstances, the name and any other identifying information of the person who made the report must be redacted before the data or information is made available.

Assembly Bill 224 (Biometrics/criminal history)

Effective May 25, 2015

Why the change: Current law requires a complete set of fingerprints sent to the FBI from the State of Nevada Central Repository. This law change will allow for “one or more” fingerprints or other biometric identifiers (iris scan, voiceprint, scar, tattoo, etc.) to be sent to the Central repository which will allow law enforcement to use new technology available now and in the future.

- AB224 provides that certain information may be requested of and received from the Federal Bureau of Investigation by, depending upon the purpose of the request, the submission of a complete set of fingerprints, one or more fingerprints or other “biometric identifier” which is defined in this bill as a fingerprint, palm print, scar, bodily mark, tattoo, voiceprint, facial image, retina image or iris image of a person.

Assembly Bill 244 (Graffiti repeat offender)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Three strikes for taggers...

- Existing law provides that a person who unlawfully places graffiti on or otherwise defaces the public or private property of another without the permission of the owner is guilty of a misdemeanor, gross misdemeanor or felony, depending on the value of the loss of the property. (NRS 206.330) This bill provides that if a person has previously been convicted two or more times of placing graffiti on or otherwise defacing public or private property or has previously been convicted of a felony for such conduct, and the person commits another such violation; regardless of the value of the loss, the person is guilty of a category D felony.

Assembly Bill 267 (Sentencing of minors)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Eliminates "life without" prison sentences for persons convicted of crimes that were committed while they were less than 18 years of age.

- AB267 eliminates the imposition of a sentence of life without the possibility of parole upon a person convicted of certain crimes who was less than 18 years of age at the time the crime was committed, thereby making life imprisonment *with* the possibility of parole the maximum punishment that may be imposed upon a person convicted of any crime who was less than 18 years of age at the time the crime was committed.

Assembly Bill 287 (SWATTING)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: It is currently a gross misdemeanor to misuse 911. There is a growing and very dangerous trend of people calling the non-emergency line of law enforcement to falsely report outrageous crimes in progress, which usually will result in the law enforcement agency sending a great amount of resources to the alleged scene; up to and including a SWAT response. This false reporting of crimes is called "swatting" and done for a variety of reasons – retaliation, entertainment, diversion, etc. – and places many persons, including responding personnel, in harm's way.

- AB287 makes it a gross misdemeanor for a person to knowingly or willfully make or cause to be made a nonemergency telephone call to report an emergency on any nonemergency telephone line (similar to existing law for emergency [911] lines) maintained by a governmental entity if no actual or perceived emergency exists.
- This bill also makes it a category E felony for a person to commit either offense if the person intended to initiate an emergency response and the emergency response initiated by that person results in the death or serious bodily injury of another.
- This bill further provides that a person who is convicted of a category E felony for such an offense is liable for any costs incurred by any governmental entity as a result of his or her conduct.
- Finally, this bill provides that if a defendant who is charged with a violation of the provisions of this bill suffers from a mental illness or is intellectually disabled, the court may, if appropriate, assign the defendant to a program for the treatment of mental illness or intellectual disabilities.

Assembly Bill 386 (Squatting)

Effective October 1, 2015

Why the change: Some people just take up residence in other people's houses (abandoned, vacant, foreclosed or otherwise) and it is very difficult to have them removed. Law enforcement officers who respond are often presented very legitimate looking contracts or agreements which they do not have the authority to interpret as valid or not. This makes the "tenancy" of the person in the home a civil matter between them and the true property owner.

While this bill makes an effort to address the issue, it is a very involved and technical bill and will require legal interpretation as to its application in the operational environment.

- Existing law sets forth procedures for the removal of a person who is guilty of forcible entry, forcible detainer or unlawful detainer. This bill revises provisions governing the service of a notice to surrender by:
 - (1) providing for different posting and mailing requirements;
 - (2) eliminating the requirement that a witness be present for service if notice is served by a sheriff, constable or licensed process server; and
 - (3) revising the contents of proof of service that must be filed with a court.
- Existing law authorizes and sets forth a summary procedure for eviction of a tenant of certain types of properties who is guilty of unlawful detainer for: (1) continuing in possession of real property after the expiration of a specific term; (2) continuing in possession after expiration of a notice to surrender; (3) waste, nuisance, violation of certain lease terms and committing certain unlawful activities; and (4) failure to perform lease or agreement conditions or covenants. This bill revises this summary procedure as it relates to the contents of certain notices served upon a tenant and the commencement and conduct of court proceedings in contested cases.
- Existing law provides that a tenant's neglect or failure to perform any condition or covenant of the lease or agreement under which property is held constitutes unlawful detainer and warrants the commencement of proceedings to remove the tenant. This bill revises the types of property to which these provisions apply and specifies the regular and summary procedures, if applicable, by which a landlord may remove a tenant from the property.
- This bill revises the definitions of "forcible entry" and "forcible detainer," establish requirements relating to a notice to surrender that must be served upon a person who commits forcible entry or forcible detainer and authorize the entry of judgment for three times the amount of actual damages for such offenses under certain circumstances.
- This bill establishes a procedure by which an owner of a dwelling that is the object of a housebreaking or unlawful occupancy may retake possession of and change the locks on the dwelling.
- This bill establishes a procedure by which an occupant who has been locked out of a dwelling may seek to recover possession of the dwelling.
- This bill sets forth the acts which constitute the criminal offenses of housebreaking, unlawful occupancy and unlawful reentry and the penalties that attach upon conviction.
- This bill establishes a procedure by which the owner of a dwelling that was subject to forcible entry or forcible detainer may seek to recover possession of the dwelling.

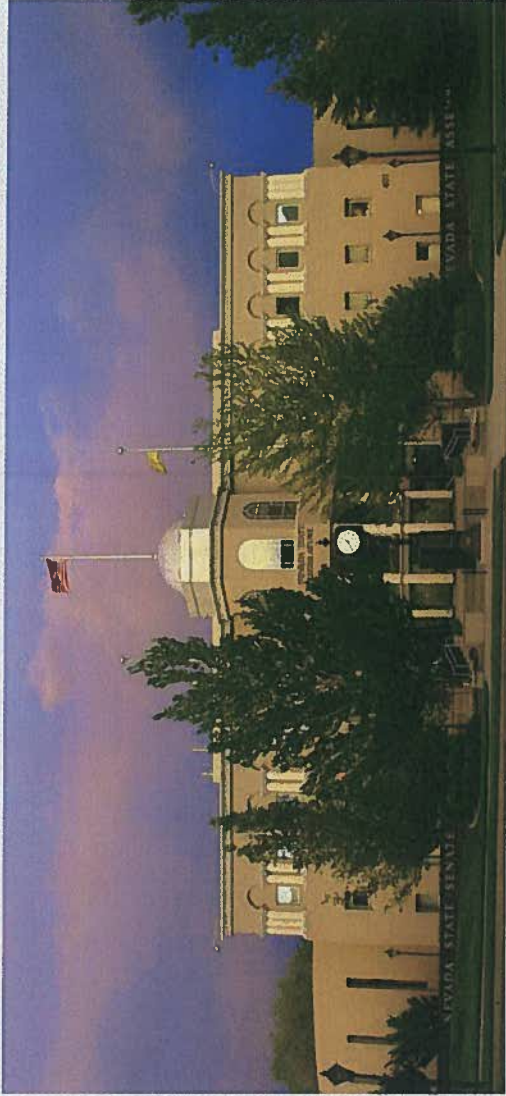

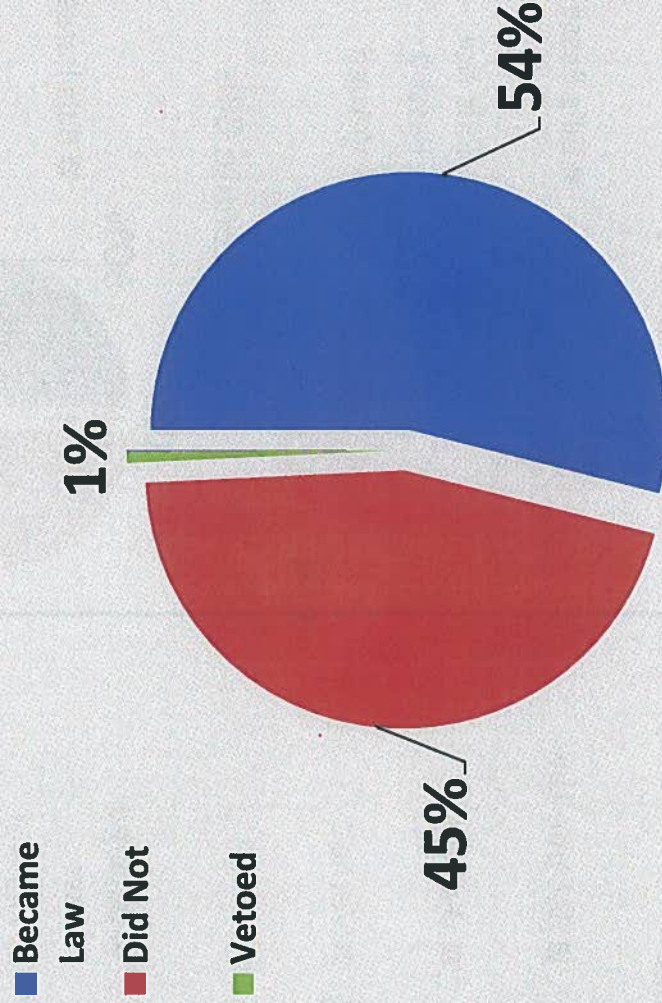




Overall Bill Statistics

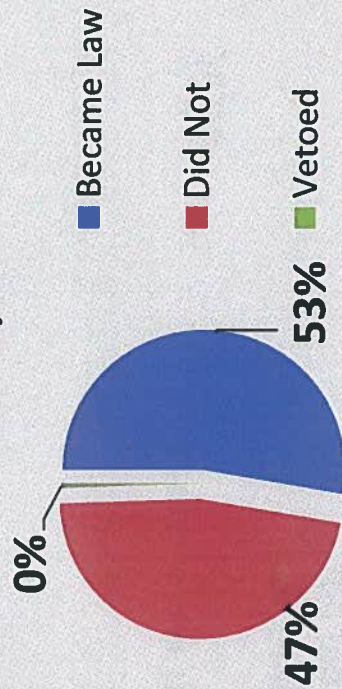
Total Assembly & Senate Bills



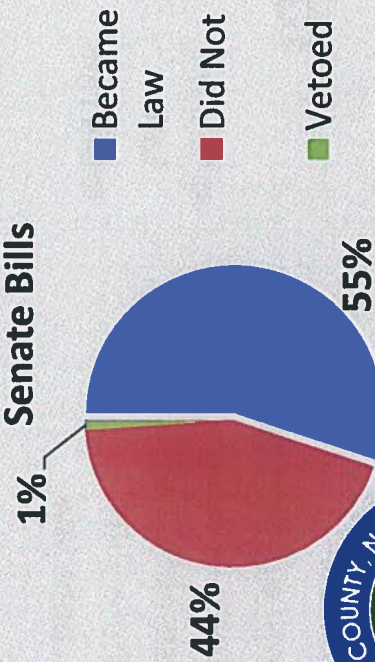
