## **SUMMARY**

The flooding events of January 6 and February 23 have been declared disasters by the Washoe County Board of County Commissioners, the Governor of the State of Nevada and also by the United States President, which will allow for federal reimbursement of a portion of up to 75% of the eligible expenditures related to these disasters. The County may also request funding from the State's Disaster Relief Account for up to half of the remaining 25% in matching funds required. To request this disaster relief funding, the County must submit a Notice of Intent to request funding within 60 days after the Commissioners declare a disaster, as required by NRS 353.2755. To date the County has submitted a notice of intent for the January 6 Flood within the 60 day requirement, and the Board is asked to ratify this notice. Additionally, the Board is asked to approve a second notice of intent to request funding for the February 23 Flood, which must be submitted by April 24.

Washoe County Strategic Objective supported by this item: <u>Safe</u>, <u>Secure and Healthy Communities</u>

## **PREVIOUS ACTION**

On January 6, 2017 the Board of County Commissioners declared a state of emergency due to the anticipated effects of the series of high-precipitation storms predicted for Northern Nevada including possible flooding of the Truckee River and other local natural and constructed drainage facilities.

On February 23, 2017 Washoe County Manager John Slaughter declared an emergency as widespread flooding from Swan Lake was causing the need for extraordinary measures to be taken to protect the public health, safety and welfare. Washoe County Code section

63.520 allows the County Manager to declare an emergency when circumstances prevent timely action by the Board, providing the Manager seeks the ratification of the declaration by a majority of the Board at the next lawful meeting of the Board. The Board ratified the February 23 declaration on March 14, 2017.

## **BACKGROUND**

On March 3, 2017, the County submitted a written Notice of Intent to request funding from the State Disaster Relief Account for the January flooding event, to ensure the request was made within the required 60 days. This Notice of Intent must be ratified by the Board to meet the requirements of NRS 353.2755.

In addition, the County is asking the Board to approve submission of a Notice of Intent to request State disaster relief funding for the February flooding event affecting many parts of Washoe County, most notably the North Valleys.

Submission of a Notice of Intent to request disaster relief funding is not a guarantee that costs will be eligible for funding by the State. The County has 18 months to submit an application to the State Division of Emergency Management and the State Department of Taxation to request the funding. The application requires the County to specify whether the request is for a grant or a loan, provide an assessment of the need for the funding, the amount of money available in the County's Stabilization Fund for the payment of expenses incurred due to the disaster, a determination of the type and value of resources the County may be required to provide as a condition for funding, and a written report of damages prepared by the State Division of Emergency Management.

## FISCAL IMPACT

To date estimated costs resulting from the two flooding events are as follows:

- 1. January Flood estimated total cost \$3,860,000. The County is working with FEMA for possible reimbursement of up to 75% of eligible costs (\$2,895,000). The County would be responsible for the remaining 25% of costs (\$965,000), of which half, or \$482,500 may be eligible for funding from the State Disaster Relief Account.
- 2. February Flood estimated total cost to date is \$4,500,000. However, costs are still being compiled and the event has not yet ended, therefore the final costs may exceed that amount.

## RECOMMENDATION

Approve Notices of Intent to request funding from the State Disaster Relief Account.

## **POSSIBLE MOTION**

Ratify the submission of a Notice of Intent to request funding from the State Disaster Relief Account for the January 6, 2017 declared Flood Disaster, and approve the submission of a Notice of Intent to request funding from the State Disaster Relief Account for the February 23, 2017 declared Flood Disaster.

This letter serves as Washoe County's written notice of intent to request funding from the State Disaster Relief Account, pursuant to NRS 354.2755 for the damages incurred to public infrastructure and cost associated that resulted from the January flooding events in Washoe County.

Under NRS, the County's Board of Commissioners must determine that the event constituted a disaster. Am emergency declaration was requested by Washoe County. The Cities of Reno and Sparks as well as the State of Nevada also declared a state of emergency for the January 2017 flooding event. Attached are the declarations of the City of Reno dated January 6, 2017 and City of Sparks also dated January 6, 2017. Attached also is the State of Nevada's Declaration of Emergency dated January 7<sup>th</sup>, 2017, in regard to the multi-jurisdictional flood event. The County is writing this letter to conform to the 60 day time limit for informing the State of intent to utilize funds. The County also understands that it must submit an application with all supporting financial information and documentation to the State Department of Taxation within eighteen months of the date of this written notification for consideration of disaster relief funding.

## DECLARATION OF STATE OF EMERGENCY FOR ALL AREAS OF WASHOE COUNTY

WHEREAS, Nevada Revised Statutes Chapter 414 and Washoe County Code 65.320 authorize and declare the authority of the Washoe County Board of Commissioners to declare a state of emergency and authorize the Washoe County Manager to exercise the powers described therein including, but not limited to, the powers described in NRS 414.090 and WCC 65.320, in circumstances when any man-made or natural event or circumstance is causing or threatening loss of life, injury to person or property, human suffering or financial loss to the extent that extraordinary measures must be taken to protect the public health, safety, and welfare; and,

WHEREAS, the Washoe County Board of Commissioners, following a meeting held pursuant to NRS 241.020, does hereby find that an emergency as defined at WCC 65.300(4) and NRS 241.020(10) exists in that man-made or natural events or circumstances including but not limited to flood, severe weather, disruption of utility services, and other potential and related events in Washoe County, including <u>ALL AREAS OF WASHOE COUNTY COMMENCING</u> 2:00 p.m. JANUARY 6, 2017 are causing or threatening loss of life, injury to person or property, human suffering or financial loss to the extent that extraordinary measures must be taken to protect the public health, safety, and welfare; and,

WHEREAS, these conditions of extreme peril warrant and necessitate the declaration of the existence of a state of emergency.

NOW, FOR THE REASONS RECITED HEREIN, IT IS HEREBY DECLARED THAT A STATE OF EMERGENCY EXISTS IN <u>ALL AREAS OF WASHOE COUNTY, COMMENCING 2:00p.m.,</u> <u>JANUARY 6, 2017</u>.

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED, that during the existence of said local state of emergency, the powers, functions, and duties of the County Manager, Emergency Management Administrator, and the Emergency Services System of this County shall be those prescribed by State Law, by Ordinances and Resolutions of this County, and by the County of Washoe emergency plans.

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED, that said local emergency shall be deemed to continue to exist unless the Board of County Commissioners, at its next lawful meeting, fails to ratify the declaration, or until the County Manager or Board of County Commissioners determines the state of emergency no longer exists or the threat of an emergency has passed, and the County Manager or the Board of Commissioners terminates the state of emergency.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, that a copy of this declaration is forwarded to the Nevada Director of the Division of Emergency Management.

## DECLARATION OF THE EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL STATE OF EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, the Reno Municipal Code Section 8.34, Emergency Management, empowers the Mayor of the City of Reno to proclaim the existence of a local state of emergency when the City is affected by a public calamity; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor has been requested by the City Manager of the City of Reno to proclaim the existence of a local state of emergency; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor does hereby find:

There exists an occurrence or threatened occurrence within the City of Reno which constitutes a defined emergency under NRS 414,0345. The threatened Emergency includes conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property caused by high winds, severe weather, heavy rain, significant flooding and accumulation of water and debris in rivers, streams, ditches, water tributaries and water transportation and related systems within the City, and it is anticipated that such events may result in flooding, dangerous water accumulation, possible landslides, disruption of utility services, disruption of interstate travel, damage to property and threat to the safety of persons, and other potential and related emergency events (collectively "Emergency"). The threatened Emergency was initiated due to severe weather system approaching the region which is threatening the safety of persons, personal property and real property located in the City of Reno and the County of Washoe. The Emergency commenced on or about the 6th day of January, 2017, at approximately 12:00 p.m.

That the aforesaid conditions of extreme peril warrant and necessitate the proclamation of the existence of a local state of emergency; and

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY PROCLAIMED that a local state of emergency now exists in the City of Reno; and

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that during the existence of the local state of emergency, the powers, functions, and duties of the City Manager and the Emergency Services System of the City shall be those prescribed by state law, ordinances and resolutions of the City and the City of Reno Emergency Operation Plan.

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that the local state of emergency shall be deemed to continue to exist until its termination is proclaimed by the Mayor, Assistant Mayor, Reno City Council, or the Reno City Manager.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that a copy of this declaration be forwarded to the Nevada Director of the Division of Emergency Management.

## SPARKS CITY MANAGER OR HIS DESIGNEE'S DECLARATION OF THE EXISTENCE OF LOCAL STATE OF EMERGENCY and MAYOR'S CONCURRENCE OF A LOCAL STATE OF EMERGENCY

WHEREAS, on January 6, 2017, the City Manager or his designee of the City of Sparks found that: A MAJOR WINTER STORM EVENT IN THE NORTHERN SIERRA NEVADA WHICH BEGAN ON JANUARY 3, 2017 TO BE FOLLOWED BY AN EXTENDED PERIOD OF HEAVY RAIN RANGING FROM THE VALLEY FLOOR TO EXTREMELY HIGH ELEVATIONS AROUND THE REGION HAS OR WILL RESULT IN BOTH URBAN AND TRUCKEE RIVER FLOODING IN THE CITY OF SPARKS; creating a condition of extreme imminent peril to life and property exists in the City of Sparks; and

WHEREAS, Sparks Municipal Code Section 1.30.010 empowers the City Manager or his designee to proclaim the existence of a local state of emergency and to request state and federal assistance when said city is affected by or in imminent danger of a public calamity and the City Council is not in session; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Sparks was not in session and could not immediately be called into session; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager or his designee hereby finds: based on the above described conditions, circumstances posing extreme imminent peril to the safety of persons and property exists within the city, and that the aforesaid conditions of extreme imminent peril warrant and necessitate the declaration of the existence of a local state of emergency.

WHEREAS, it has now been found that local resources are unable to cope with the effects of said emergency.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY DECLARED, that a local state of emergency exists throughout the City of Sparks; and

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED, that during the existence of said local state of emergency, the powers, functions, and duties of the City Manager or his designee, and the Emergency Services System of the city shall be those prescribed by state law, by Ordinances and Resolutions of the city, and by the City of Sparks Emergency Operations Plan.

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED, that said local emergency shall be deemed to continue to exist unless the City Council, at its next lawful meeting on which the Resolution is agendized, fails to ratify the declaration, or until the City Manager or his designee, or City Council determines the state of emergency no longer exists or the threat of an emergency has passed, and the City Manager or his designee, or the City Council terminates the state of emergency.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY DECLARED AND ORDERED, that a copy of this declaration be forwarded to the Nevada Director of the Division of Emergency Management.

IT IS FURTHER DECLARED that the City Manager or his designee is hereby designated as the authorized representative of the City of Sparks for the purpose of receipt, processing, and coordination of all inquiries and requirements necessary to obtain available state and federal assistance.

## MAYOR'S CONCURRENCE OF A LOCAL STATE OF EMERGENCY

I, Geno R. ## DECLARATION OF EMERGENCY

Whereas, Nevada Revised Statute 414.070 authorizes the Governor to issue a proclamation declaring a state of emergency when a natural disaster of major proportions has occurred within this state, and the assistance of state agencies is needed to supplement the efforts and capabilities of political subdivisions to save lives, protect property, and protect the health and safety of persons in this state; and

Whereas, a severe weather system beginning on January 7, 2017, is affecting the counties of Washoe, Douglas, Lyon, and Storey, the City of Carson City, the Rono-Sparks Indian Colony, the Pyramid Lake Painte Tribe, and the Washoe Tribe of Nevada and California, with heavy rainfall and the potential of significant flooding throughout the region; and

Whereas, the severe weather system threatens to damage residential and commercial structures in the affected areas, as well as, the health, safety, and welfare of persons in this state; and

Whereas, as of January 7, 2017, the counties of Washoe, Douglas, Lyon, and Storey, the City of Carson City, the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony, the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe, and the Washoe Tribe of Nevada and California, have declared a state of emergency due to the anticipated effects of the severe weather system; and

Whereas, the counties of Washoe, Douglas, Lyon, and Storey, the City of Carson City, the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony, the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe, and the Washoe Tribe of Nevada and California are experiencing a significant economic impact in providing emergency services in preparation for the severe weather system and anticipate continued economic obligations resulting in financial hardship for short-term response and long-term recovery of the affected areas; and

Whereas, the counties of Washoe, Douglas, Lyon, and Storey, the City of Carson City, the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony, the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe, and the Washoe Tribe of Nevada and California require the assistance of the state government to save lives, protect property, and protect the health and safety of persons in this state; and

Now Therefore, I, Brian Sandoval, Governor of the State of Nevada, pursuant to the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Nevada, hereby declare a state of emergency due to the severe weather system affecting northern Nevada and the consequent danger to life and damage to property, and direct all state agencies to supplement the efforts of Washoe, Douglas,

Lyon, and Storey counties, the City of Carson City, the Reno-Sparks Indian Colony, the Pyramid Lake Painte Tribe, and the Washoe Tribe of Nevada and California to save lives, protect property, and protect the health and safety of persons in this state.
