SB 12	<p>Revises provisions governing telephone systems used for reporting emergencies. (BDR 20-475) Allows for the fees collected through the E911 charge to be used for an audit to the fee to determine if all collections are occurring. <i>Status: Heard in Senate Government Affairs on February 11</i></p>	Support
SB 103	<p>Revises provisions relating to development and maintenance of affordable housing. (BDR 22-379) Allows for the reduction or subsidizing of impact fees for building permits on affordable housing after review by the Board of County Commissioners for those impacts from the enterprise fund. <i>Status: Heard in Senate Government Affairs on February 11</i></p>	Support

AB 4	<p>Authorizes cities to create a district for a city fire department. (BDR 21-459) Allows cities to create a fire district, but removes separation and allows to be run by the City Council. <i>Status: Scheduled for hearing in Assembly Government Affairs on February 19</i></p>	Neutral

SB 25	<p>Revises provisions governing the administration of the surcharge imposed on telephone users. (BDR 20-442) Allows for the fees collected through the E911 charge to be used for the reimbursement of staff time associated with the use of body cameras. <i>Status: Scheduled for hearing in Senate Government Affairs on February 20</i></p>	Concern as written

AB 101	<p>Authorizes a private plaintiff to bring an action for a declaratory judgement regarding a violation of state law or a local ordinance by certain governmental entities. (BDR 3-26) Allows and individual to bring a declaratory judgement against the state or political subdivision if they believe a violation has occurred. Removes the current restrictions of who as a private plaintiff could bring forward a declaratory judgement. <i>Status: Heard in Assembly Judiciary on February 14</i></p>	Oppose

AB 102	<p>Enhances the criminal penalty for certain crimes committed against certain family members of first responders. (BDR 15-48) Allows for additional charges to be brought when a crime occurs against a family member of a first responder, the additional charge is currently eligible when a crime is committed against first responders. <i>Status: Referred to Assembly Judiciary</i></p>	Support- Request from TMFPD

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SB 13	<p>Authorizes the board of county commissioners of a county to form a nonprofit to aid the county in providing certain governmental services. (BDR 20-483)</p> <p>Allows a county to create a nonprofit to help provide certain services during an emergency or time of need.</p> <p>Commissioner request to expand to allow County to create 501c3 for any event.</p> <p><i>Status: Heard in Senate Government Affairs on February 11</i></p>	Support

AB 3	<p>Authorizes the Department of Taxation to issue additional licenses for retail marijuana stores and certificates for medical marijuana dispensaries upon the request of a city. (BDR 40-360)</p> <p>Would allow cities to request additional retail stores or dispensaries, which currently only counties can request.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Assembly Taxation</i></p>	Watch
AB 18	<p>Authorizes certain local governments to install and maintain ramps on certain public easements and rights-of-way. (BDR 21-433)</p> <p>Would allow GIDs to install and maintain ramps to be placed on public easements and right-of-ways.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Assembly Government Affairs</i></p>	Watch
AB 30	<p>Revises provisions governing the appropriation of water. (BDR 48-214)</p> <p>Makes changes to the appropriation of water.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Assembly Natural Resources, Agriculture and Mining</i></p>	Watch
AB 38	<p>Requires certain persons to report actual and suspected drug overdoses. (BDR 40-412)</p> <p>Makes changes to the reporting of overdoses.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Assembly Health and Human Services</i></p>	Watch
AB 40	<p>Revises provisions relating to public office. (BDR 23-401)</p> <p>Makes changes to the ability to give gifts to all elected officials in Nevada, same restrictions for Legislators.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Assembly Legislative Operations and Election</i></p>	Watch
AB 43	<p>Increases the number of district judges in certain judicial districts. (BDR 1-498)</p> <p>Would add one new judge to the Second District Judicial Court</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Assembly Judiciary</i></p>	Watch
AB 49	<p>Revises provisions relating to the monitoring of prescriptions for controlled substances. (BDR 40-420)</p> <p>Makes new reporting and investigation for overdoses.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Assembly on Health and Human Services</i></p>	Watch
AB 51	<p>Revises provisions governing the management of water. (BDR 48-213)</p> <p>Changes the assessment to value water.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Assembly on Natural Resources, Agriculture and Mining</i></p>	Watch
	<p>Revises provisions relating to the board of trustees of certain school districts. (BDR 340-400)</p>	

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AB 57	<p>Would make changes to the School Board Trustees in Washoe and Clark and would have 4 members appointed, 1 by the Governor, 1 by Washoe County and 1 from each of the 2 largest cities in the counties. <i>Status: Referred to Assembly Education</i></p>	Watch
AB66	<p><i>Provides for the establishment of crisis stabilization centers in certain counties. (BDR 39-486)</i> Establishes a Crisis Stabilization in Washoe and Clark to help those experiencing a crisis beside an emergency room or jail. <i>Status: Referred to Assembly Health and Human Services</i></p>	Watch
AB 70	<p><i>Revises provisions governing the Open Meeting Law. (BDR 19-421)</i> Makes various changes to Open Meeting Law that would be costly and concerning to the county. <i>Status: Referred to Assembly Government Affairs</i></p>	Watch
AB 73	<p><i>Provides for additional sources of funding for services and affordable housing for persons who are homeless or indigent. (BDR 32-461)</i> Applies only to Clark county, but allows Clark County to impose a real estate transfer tax to be used for homeless or indigent care. The bill also allows cities to increase their sewer fees to be used for homeless or indigent care. <i>Status: Referred to Assembly Government Affairs</i></p>	Watch
AB 86	<p><i>Revises provisions relating to governmental purchasing. (BDR 27-182)</i> Makes changes to when governments would have to go to bid for projects. <i>Status: Referred to Assembly Government Affairs</i></p>	Watch
AB 95	<p><i>Revises provisions relating to water. (BDR 48-504)</i> Would reduce the rights of domestic wells from 2.00 acre-feet per year to 0.5 acre-feet per year, in lieu of a full curtailment, if a curtailment order is issued by the State Engineer. <i>Status: Referred to Assembly Natural Resources, Agriculture and Mining</i></p>	Watch
AB 103	<p><i>Makes certain changes relating to collective bargaining. (BDR 23-251)</i> Shifts cost of association leave to the county. <i>Status: Scheduled to be heard in Assembly Government Affairs on February 18</i></p>	Watch
AB 119	<p><i>Revises provisions governing workers' compensation. (BDR 53-605)</i> Changes timeline for review of claims to 30 days. <i>Status: Referred to Assembly Commerce and Labor</i></p>	Watch

AB 132	<p><i>Revises provisions governing employment practices. (BDR 53-29)</i> Prohibits the denial of employment based on presence of marijuana in a screening test with limited exceptions.</p>	Watch

SB 10	<p>Revises provisions governing compensation of members of a board of trustees of a general improvement district. (BDR 25-432)</p> <p>Increase compensation for GID Trustees from \$6,000 to \$9,000 per year.</p> <p><i>Status: Heard in Senate Government Affairs on February 13</i></p>	Watch
SB 36	<p>Revises provisions governing the purchase, sale or lease of real property by a board of county commissioners. (BDR 20-489)</p> <p>Value for county property that is to be sold or leased would begin at the average of 2 appraisals as opposed to the higher of the appraisals. The bill also allows for county's to do property auctions online.</p> <p><i>Status: Heard in Senate Government Affairs on February 6</i></p>	Watch
SB54	<p>Revises provisions governing the annual reporting requirements of the Tahoe Regional Planning Agency. (BDR 22-205)</p> <p>Changes the date that the Tahoe Regional Planning Agency must submit their annual report to the Legislative Counsel Bureau to February 28 from January 31.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Senate Natural Resources</i></p>	Watch
SB58	<p>Revises provisions relating to relations between local governments and certain public employees. (BDR 23-465)</p> <p>Gives local governments more flexibly to work with employee organizations.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Senate Government Affairs</i></p>	Watch
SB 66	<p>Revises provisions related to emergency management. (BDR 36-356)</p> <p>Creates a board to meet monthly and create a plan for the occurrence of a event such as 1 October.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Senate Education</i></p>	Watch
SB 105	<p>Revises provisions relating to the board of trustees of certain school districts. (BDR 34-156)</p> <p>Would make changes to the School Board Trustees in Washoe and Clark and would have 4 members appointed, 1 by the Governor, 1 by Washoe County and 1 from each of the 2 largest cities in the counties.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Senate Education</i></p>	Watch
SB 107	<p>Revises provisions relating to public office. (BDR 24-18)</p> <p>Would require some elected officials to resign their seat before being able to file for elected office. If not done so resignation is determined to occur when the nomination papers are filed.</p> <p><i>Status: Heard in Senate Legislative Operations and Election on February 11</i></p>	Watch
SB 111	<p>Revises provisions governing collective bargaining by local employers. (BDR 31-651)</p> <p>Decreases the amount of ending fund balance a County can shield from collective bargaining.</p> <p><i>Status: Referred to Senate Government Affairs</i></p>	Watch

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SB 118	<p>Makes the office of registrar of voters an elected position. (BDR 20-597)</p> <p>Would make the Registrar of Voters elected and the Board of County Commissioners would set their salary. <i>Status: Heard in Senate Legislative Operations and Election on February 11</i></p>	Watch
SB 121	<p><i>Revises provisions relating to fiduciaries. (BDR 13-99)</i></p> <p>Would greatly expand the Public Guardian's investigatory role. <i>Status: Referred to Senate Judiciary</i></p>	Watch
SB 122	<p><i>Revises provisions relating to the qualifications of certain candidates for partisan offices. (BDR 24-52)</i></p> <p>Requires that a partisan candidate be designated by the party and all past affiliations be submitted. <i>Status: Heard in Senate Legislative Operations and Elections on February 11</i></p>	Watch
SB 136	<p><i>Revises the provisions of the Tahoe Regional Planning Compact. (BDR 22-736)</i></p> <p>Makes changes to the board members, if California passes the same legislation. <i>Status: Referred to Senate Natural Resources</i></p>	Watch
SB 143	<p><i>Repeals, revises and reenacts provisions relating to background checks for certain sales or transfers of firearms. (BDR 15-755)</i></p> <p>Related to the ballot question on background checks, made changes so that the state will conduct the background checks rather than FBI background checks to implement the ballot question approved in 2016. <i>Status: Approved by Senate and Assembly, sent to Governor</i></p>	Watch
SB 153	<p><i>Revises provisions relating to collective bargaining. (BDR 23-405)</i></p> <p>Makes changes to how contracts would work during bargaining, states that an expired contract would be valid until a new contract is agreed upon. <i>Status: Referred to Senate Government Affairs</i></p>	Watch
